#### Message from District Foundation Chair

In this newsletter, we remember Paul Alexander, a 78-year-old Polio victim from Texas who died on March 11, 2024. Paul Alexander contracted polio in 1952 when he was a six-year-old boy and spent most of his life in an iron lung. The disease paralyzed him from the neck down so he couldn't breathe on his own. He earned a law degree, passed the bar exam, and practiced law in Dallas. He was also briefly a member of a Rotary e-club.

In 2015 Paul came to know that Rotary fights to eradicate the very disease that left him almost completely paralyzed during a business meeting he had with a member in Duncanville, Texas.

"I was completely blown away by the idea. For all these years, I didn't know the work they were doing," says Alexander, a practicing attorney in Dallas. "It's such a perfect fit for me." To learn more about Paul's life in an iron lung, please click on the link below:



As a founding partner of the Global Polio Eradication Initiative, Rotary reduced polio cases by 99.9 percent. We continue our fight to eradicate polio from the world. The 2023-24 Rotary year has been a busy year for international service projects. With DDF from the Rotary Foundation and cash from our clubs, seven global grant projects with a YTD funding of \$681,666 have been approved by the Rotary Foundation. Four more projects with total funding of \$601,147 is pending approval. I encourage you to attend the Global Grants training session at the District Assembly on May 11, 2024, in Dublin to learn how to do global grant projects from Savannah, Savannah East, and Savannah South Rotarians who are actively working on global grant projects in Rwanda, Panama and Uganda.

#### **Current Status**

Since 1988, we've seen a worldwide reduction in polio cases of 99.9%. Only two countries remain polio-endemic: Afghanistan and Pakistan.

Spotlight: District Grant Project Inspires Reading for Students

Rotarian Nancy White knows that reading at Burdell-Hunt Elementary School in Macon, GA is something that's supposed to benefit the students, but she says the project funded in part by The Rotary Foundation benefits her, too. "Selfishly it does more for me than the young children, as I leave the school feeling inspired, connected and happy, "she says."

The project, Jumpstart's Read for the Record, is the world's largest shared reading experience that celebrates children's early language and social-emotional development. The Rotary Club of Macon has selected the project since 2020 as one to fund in part through a grant from Rotary District 6920 made possible through The Rotary Foundation.

Each year District 6920 offers Clubs the opportunity to apply for a grant to benefit their community. During the 2023-24 Rotary year, Club and District grant projects totaled

\$68,006. With these funds and added matching funds from Clubs collectively nearly \$127,000 will be invested in District 6920 for projects that benefit hunger, education, literacy, environmental, medical, economic development, and other needs. The grant funds come from donations that Clubs and their Members made to The Rotary Foundation three years ago. This year, the Macon Rotary Club, a long-time champion of literacy projects, was recognized as one of the top 25 participants nationally in the Read for the Record program.

So, what do the Members do to carry out the project? Club Members visited the elementary school and read this year's designated book *With Lots of Love* written by **Jenny Torres Sanchez** and illustrated by **André Ceolin** to students in each classroom. The Club purchased enough copies of the book to give a copy of it to each student.

"Rotarians are always excited to go into the school to meet students and teachers," says Club Member Kathy McCollum. "Our club is very aware of how important reading is for elementary school students and members are eager to help them develop a love for reading and learning," she adds.


White says, "I strive to connect the kids to the story through pacing and expression and key questions. I love how quickly they warm to me, a stranger walking into their classroom. And knowing we are placing a quality picture book into the hands of each child to take home is gratifying."
